ABOUT RABIES IN BATS

In the US, bats are the most commonly reported animals to have rabies. Rabies is almost always fatal if not treated, however it is 100% preventable through prompt Post-Exposure Prophylaxis (PEP). PEP is a vaccination series given on days 0, 3, 7, and 14 following a bat exposure. The best way to prevent rabies is to avoid encounters with bats.



SIGNS OF RABIES IN BATS

- Active during the day.
- Found in an unusual place, such as in the home or on the ground.
- Unable to fly or is easily approached.
- Behaves abnormally, such as being disoriented.

Notify animal control or the health department if you notice strange bat behavior. Do NOT touch it!

WHO TO CONTACT

- If you've been scratched, bitten, or have woken up with a bat in your room, contact a medical provider immediately.
- For guidance on capturing a bat for testing & to notify public health, contact the Zanesville-Muskingum County Health Department at (740) 454-9741.

WHAT TO DO O1 WASH AREA

Immediately wash the affected area with soap & water.

O2 SEEK MEDICAL ATTENTION

If you suspect you've been scratched or bitten, begin the rabies vaccine series ASAP.

03 NOTIFY PUBLIC HEALTH

Guidance on capturing the bat for testing will be provided to determine rabies status.



Did you know?

A bat's fangs can be so small that a person may not realize that they have been bitten. If you wake up with a bat in your room you should treat it as if you received a scratch or bite.

- Contact an animal control or wildlife agency for assistance with "bat-proofing" your home.
- Check for any openings, as small as 1/4 of an inch.
- Caulk any openings to seal them.
- Use screens, chimney caps, and draft guards to seal attic entrances.
- Fill electrical and plumbing holes with steel wool or caulk.
- Ensure all doors and windows are sealed tightly.
- If bats are in the home, check with animal control and follow all Ohio bat laws before beginning the removal process.

HOW TO SAFELY CAPTURE A BAT FOR TESTING



- Find a container like a box or a can large enough for the bat to fit in,
- Locate a piece of cardboard large enough to cover the container opening.
- Wear leather gloves. Do NOT use a towel, pillowcase, etc.
- When the bat lands, approach slowly and place the container over it.
- Slide cardboard beneath it to trap it.
- Secure the lid using tape.
- Contact ZMCHD to have the bat tested for rabies.

PREVENT BATS FROM ENTERING YOUR HOME
